Pastor's Corner

Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time October 18, 2020

THE POLITICS IS GETTING UGLY, PRAY FOR US

Since my sermon this week is about our need to vote, I wont go into that here. But if you have been following the news at all this week, you know that the biggest story at this time (yes, this is more important than the pandemic right now) is the Senate hearings on whether to approve Amy Coney Barrett for the Supreme Court. This is possibly the biggest political battle of the century. I believe the Supreme Court has become in effect the most powerful of the three branches of our government. It was not meant to be this way originally, but it has become thus. The present hearings and Senate environment is truly ugly, on both sides. The maneuvering that is taking place is using every political loophole available to get this candidate in, or keep this from happening.

I am not addressing here the question of who you voted for in the last election, or who you are to vote for in the next. I don't mind to say that I am not a fan of President Trump. But I have often said that the best justification for voting for him was that, in his first term, he was likely to put three Supreme Court justices in office. That is huge. Ms Barrett is now the third one. His own time in office may last a couple more months, or it may be four more years. But the more lasting legacy is these three judges.

I have said on several occasions that we are one vote away from overturning the 1973 Rowe vs. Wade decision, which made unlimited access to abortion the law of the land. That vote is the vote of a Supreme Court justice. The reality is that this issue which we have fought for over 40 years could now come to a head.

I ask at this time for your prayers: prayers that Ms Barrett will in fact be able to take her seat on the Supreme Court. It could be an open door to pull the rug out from the darkest scourge of our nation's history, and to literally save millions of lives. One such life could be that of your own grandchild.

MEANWHILE, ON THE MORE IMMEDIATE, PERSONAL LEVEL....

Fact is, abortion is still with us. Come and join us this coming Saturday morning, and offer the sacrifice of your Saturday morning sleep, to come and pray for those who are still making the decision to abort their own child. Our prayer reaches the Lord, and our show of support reaches young women, politicians, Christians, and the hearts of all who pass by. As this battle heats up, prayers are needed more than ever. It is not a trip for the faint of heart. Will you join us at (the ungodly hour of) 4:30 AM to pray for those who are in the darkest of all places in their lives?
